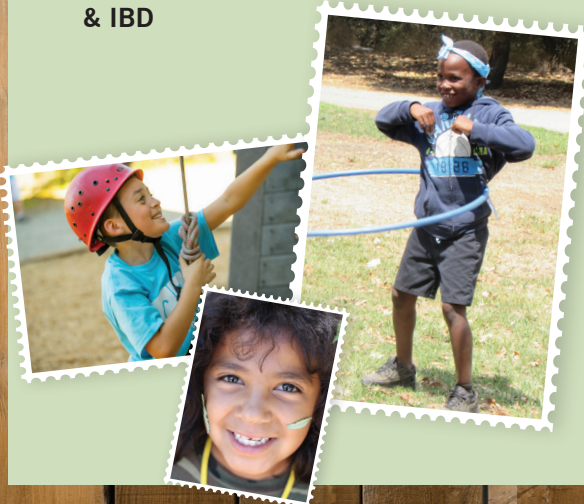


Making an Impact

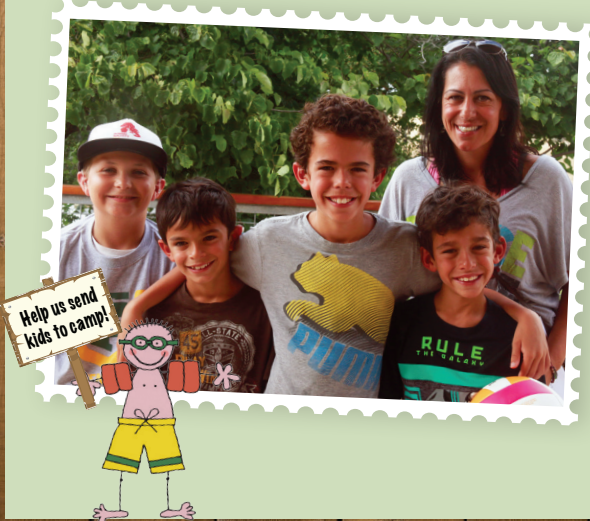
